EU Whistleblowing Directive Framework for Companies and differences with US requirements.

The EU Whistleblowing Directive (2019/1937) was introduced following a study that showed only 10 EU member states (including UK at that time) had implemented adequate protection for whistleblowers. It aims to provide consistent protection and encouragement for whistleblowers throughout the EU who discover and report wrongdoing within their organisations.

- The challenges with implementing the new EU requirements within existing USdriven programmes
- What the new rules mean for healthcare companies, whistleblowers, and society
- Advantages and disadvantages of both sets of rules, including possible unintended consequences
